PRESENTATION

Reading Lacan is supposed to be close to the experience of analysis: confusion, tolerating not knowing, the testing of one's narcissism, moments of surprise, elements that return in new ways, flashes of insight, and the accrual of another kind of knowledge, a knowledge that allows us to hear something other, especially in relation to language and the construction of subjectivity.

Lacan is often seen as maddening to American therapists. One important difficulty is that reading Lacan cannot be done alone, much as therapy is not a solitary enterprise. Lacan requires reading, discussion, instruction, repetition, and desire. Over the course of the morning, Dr. Webster hopes to introduce participants to reading Lacan clinically, selecting several pieces of text, looking at clinical material, and engaging in discussion with the audience about what it brings up in their own practice. In particular, we will look at the dialectic between anxiety and desire in phobia and hysteria, and the difficulties each present to the listening therapist.

PRESENTER

Jamieson Webster, Ph.D., is a psychoanalyst in New York City. She teaches at the New School for Social Research and is on the board and faculty of Pulsion Institute. She is the author of *The Life and Death of Psychoanalysis* (Routledge, 2011), *Stay, Illusion!* with Simon Critchley (Vintage, 2013), *Conversion Disorder* (Columbia University Press, 2018), and *Disorganisation and Sex* (Divided, 2022). She writes regularly for Artforum, The New York Review of Books, The New York Times, and Spike Art Quarterly.

OBJECTIVES

1. will gain a sense of differential diagnosis according to Lacan
2. will learn about the difference between anxiety hysteria and hysteria proper in Freud and Lacan
3. will have a sense of differing symbolic capacities in anxiety and phobia and hysteria
4. will understand the impact of unfolding treatment and technique of these various diagnostic hypotheses
